ROYAL TELEVISION SOCIETY MIDLANDS AWARDS SUE NICHOLLS THE BAIRD MEDAL FOR 2020

Birmingham, 25 November 2020 – The **Royal Television Society (RTS) Midlands Centre** has announced that Walsall born award winning-actress **Sue Nicholls** (*Coronation Street*) is the recipient of this year's prestigious Baird Medal.

Viewers of the prestigious **RTS Midlands TV Awards 2020** which are being broadcast live on the RTS's website from 8pm on Wednesday 25 November will see Sue accept the award from Corrie co-star **Jack P Shepherd**. Sue Nicholls was born in Walsall and was educated at the School of St Mary and St Anne (now known as Abbots Bromley School for Girls) before graduating from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art.

Starring in a number of popular and acclaimed British television series, Sue has had an outstanding career to date, debuting as waitress Marilyn Gates in the popular Midlands soap opera *Crossroads* from 1964-1968; and going on to appear in series such as *Pipkins, The Fall and Rise of Reginald Perrin, The Legacy of Reginald Perrin, The Professionals – The Acorn Syndrome;* as well as a tour and Broadway run in *London Assurance.* From 1979-82 and then from 1984 to present day, she has been recognised and praised for her portrayal of Audrey Roberts in one of the country's biggest soaps - *Coronation Street.*

Sue Nicholls says: "Thank you very much, I really don't deserve this award, I really don't, because it is to do with my job over the last sixty years and that is wonderful. I feel really flattered and rather humble and very overjoyed. Thank you, thank you."

Caren Davies, Chair, RTS Midlands, says: "The Baird Medal is given to an individual from the region who has made an outstanding contribution to television and Sue has most definitely done that. She is a much-loved household name and has never forgotten her roots. Sue is a very proud Midlander and we are just as proud of her. Congratulations Sue."



Previous recipients of the Baird Medal include Sir David Attenborough, Jed Mercurio, Frank Skinner and Barbara Slater, OBE.
